**Narrative**

1. On January 9, 2023, at approximately 2:00 p.m. Idaho State Police Captain J. Kempf and I, ISP Sergeant J. Stennett, conducted an interview with [REDACTED] (DOB [REDACTED] 1991) at the [REDACTED] in Pullman, Washington. The interview was in reference to [REDACTED] knowledge of Bryan C. KOHBERGER (DOB [REDACTED]/1994).

2. [REDACTED] was a graduate student and [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] working in the [REDACTED] program. She was a fellow colleague of KOHBERGER and had an [REDACTED] to his. She was also working on a project with KOHBERGER in a limited capacity. The project was a part of the Division of Governmental Studies and

Services (DGSS).

3. She had limited interactions with KOHBERGER while working with the DGSS. One interaction was on a zoom call. The other was a follow up question concerning the project.
4. She first met KOHBERGER August in her office, two other graduate students were present. He told her he was from Pennsylvania, and he enjoyed hiking. They also spoke about his field of study, offender decision making. He was particularly interested in how emotion played a role in how offenders make decisions.
5. Throughout the semester, she would routinely discuss criminal justice topics with KOHBERGER.
6. They discussed the use of alcohol and the effects of marijuana on society. He told her he was not a drinker and did not understand why people drank.
7. She said KOHBERGER really liked to discuss research and he liked to dominate the conversations. She described him standing in the doorway and hovering. She never felt uncomfortable around him. He had a macho demeanor about him and would appear to be puffed up. The only thing she felt was off about KOHBERGER was his intense stare. He would intensely stare at people even when he wasn't having a conversation with that person.
8. She described having a conversation with him in her office she tried to end, and he would not stop talking. She told him she was leaving because she wanted to avoid getting a parking violation. She walked out and he continued to talk to her while she was walking to her car.
9. She did not have any relationship with him outside of school.
10. She could not recall seeing him much after the homicides.
11. She was aware of an issue he had with a [REDACTED] named [REDACTED]. He was perceived by female classmates as dominant and disrespectful to female instructors. At one point [REDACTED] had come into her office crying because of a classroom discussion KOHBERGER was having with her. His behavior could be described as possibly sexist. He really did not like to be interrupted.
12. She could not relate any instances where empathy would have been used during their conversations. She did say he seemed very uptight and serious. He wanted to come off as intelligent.
13. Her understanding was KOHBERGER wanted to continue in academia and possibly become a professor.
14. She did recall one other staff pulled her aside and made her aware of a possible issue with him stalking another member of the staff. An incident took place where he asked out the other staff member and had followed that individual outside to her car. A report was filled with the office of civil rights. The [REDACTED] he asked out was [REDACTED].
15. She was shocked the homicides happened. In her hindsight, the homicides may have taken place because he had been rejected by someone. She had no knowledge of KOHBERGER talking about the homicides.
16. At approximately 2:22 p.m. the interview concluded.
